He lived a sinless life, showing us how to live; and He died upon a cross to pay for our sins. God raised Him from the dead.


Jesus is the source of eternal life. Jesus wants to be the doorway to new life for you. In the Bible He was called the "Lamb of God" (John 1:29). In the Old Testament, sacrifices were made for the sins of the people. Jesus became the sacrificial lamb offered for your sin.

Jesus said, "I am the way, the truth, and the life. No one comes to the Father except through Me" (John 14:6). He is waiting for you now.

Admit to God that you are a sinner. Repent, turning away from your sin. By faith receive Jesus Christ as God's Son and accept Jesus' gift of forgiveness from sin. He took the penalty for your sin by dying on the cross. Confess your faith in Jesus Christ as Savior and Lord.

You may pray a prayer similar to this as you call on God to save you: "Dear God, I know that You love me. I confess my sin and need of salvation. I turn away from my sin and place my faith in Jesus as my Savior and Lord. In Jesus' name I pray, amen."

After you have received Jesus Christ into your life, tell a pastor or another Christian about your decision. Show others your faith in Christ by asking for baptism by immersion in your local church as a public expression of your faith.

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
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A WORD FROM THE EDITOR...

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





INTRANSIT: WHAT DO YOU DO WITH YOUR WAIT? (FOR UNIT 1)


InTransit: What Do You Do with Your Wait? is designed to help adults understand that waiting without purpose leads to loneliness and doubt, but purposeful waiting brings a sense of fulfillment and an awareness of God's timing and faithfulness. This six-session study will introduce you to three truths about waiting as it traces the lives of David, Jesus, and Joseph. The companion journal in the back of this book gives you the opportunity to process what God's telling you along the way.





DISCIPLEMAKING: NO PLAN B (UNIT 2)

Jesus left us no Plan B. He spent three years revealing His Father, His kingdom, and His gospel, and now it's our turn. *Disciple Making: No Plan B* by Verge Network is a six-session Bible study to help you learn how to make disciples by modeling Jesus, pointing to Jesus, and putting Jesus' words into practice. You'll see how discipleship is motivated and fueled by the gospel. And if you fear you can't make disciples because you're unfit or incompetent, you'll find the gospel especially qualifies you for making disciples of Jesus. Young Adult Small Group Leaders McEwen Baptist Church, McEwen, Tennessee

The **YOU** Connect, Grow, Serve, and Go strategic focus provides alignment and application guides for young adults in our congregation. The versatility of the leader commentary and daily reading make **YOU** Bible study curriculum a "onestop guide" for small-group discipleship. Our congregation affirmed the need to start a Young Adult Sunday School class. - In the beginning was the Word: Jesus' existence in eternity past with God. The Word is the fully divine and made flesh in the person of Jesus Christ, in whom all things were created

- One and Only Son: The status of Jesus the Son in the eyes of God the Father, emphasizing Christ's obedience and faithfulness to His Father's will. Christ is the "only begotten" Son in the same nature.
- Grace and truth: Echo the Hebrew pairing of "steadfast love" and "faithfulness and justice." They are the essence of Jesus' character.



Introducing Jesus John 1:1-5.11-14



Who is Jesus?

UNIT 1 LESSON 1

A few years ago one of the kings of stand-up comedy, Steve Harvey, shared with 16,000 MegaFest participants how he would introduce Jesus Christ. His message was factual, unique, and passionate, moving himself and many in the audience to tears. John's Gospel provides a life-altering introduction to Jesus unlike any other, affirming that Jesus is the manifestation of God's love for humanity. I present to you JESUS, the Word, Life, Light and Love.

JESUS IS THE WORD

(John 1:1-2)

JESUS IS LIFE

(John 1:3-4)

JESUS IS LIGHT

JESUS IS LOVE

(John 1:11-14)

JESUS IS THE WORD JOHN 1:1-2

Read John 1:1-2. Much like we use words to communicate thoughts and ideas, the Son is God's visible expression of Himself. You have heard the adage, "A picture paints a thousand words." Try to fathom the exponential impact of the living, breathing, fully human, fully divine expression of God (Phil. 2:6).

John's prologue of Christ is unique among the four Gospels, written to believers everywhere. John's purpose for writing this Gospel was to build faith and confidence in Jesus Christ so we may believe He is the Son of God and enjoy life in Him (John 20:30-31). We should be reminded of our role in the Great Commission (Matt. 28:18-20). John used the Word (see Diggin' Deeper, p. 13) to build a bridge to invite all audiences into the deeper truths of his account of Jesus.

How do you begin conversations with others about Jesus and the life only He can give? What strategies have you used to meet people where they are? To invite others to Christ?

John speaks of the Word, a title for Jesus, and to the preexistence of the Word to the creation of the world. The Word is distinct from God and was with Him in eternity past, implying personal communion. "The Word was God" establishes His divinity. The Word is fully God, so that what will be said about the Word will be said in the fullest sense about God.

How do verses 1-2 describe the existence, dwelling place, and nature of the Word?

Read these Scripture passages to discover other characteristics of the nature of the Word:

- Psalm 33:6
- Psalm 107:20
- Isaiah 55:11

JESUS IS LIFE JOHN 1:3-4

Read John 1:3-4. Three principle theories fundamentally underline the beliefs of most of human thought regarding how the universe was created:

- God (gods) created the universe and was/were present before the universe was created.
- The universe created itself (big bang theory).
- The universe has always existed.

Number one is the correct answer. God is the Creator and Sustainer of the universe in the ultimate sense. The Word was the Agent of creation and acted to carry out God's will, giving Him preeminence over all creation. As the Creator of all, the Word is Lord of all, and our response to Him should be to recognize and submit to His authority (John 11:25; 14:6; I John 5:12).

How would you explain to a person that believes the big bang theory that God created the universe? Why is it beneficial to know and share this information?

Colossians 1:17 says, "He is before all things, and by Him all things hold together." The Bible says that God the Son is not only the Creator but also the Sustainer of this immense universe.



Diggin' Deeper

Logos

The Greek word *logos* (translated "Word") has been used often among philosophers and theologians. Of the 330 times it is used in the New Testament, it is used 40 times in John. It shows God's desire and ability to speak to humans.

John introduces Jesus as the Logos, drawing on a concept familiar to both Jews and Gentiles. We know emphatically that Jesus preexisted creation, was the Agent of creation, and is God's perfect revelation in the flesh.

The impetus for this message is to lead readers to embrace the saving work of Christ Jesus. **Read the following passages.**

- John 20:30-31
- Psalm 33-6
- Colossian 1:16

Introducing Jesus John 1:1-5.11-14



Did you know?

Tabernacle means "to dwell." The adage, "Home is where the heart is," captures the essence of God's desire (John 3:16) for us and reverberates His love and grace toward His people. The Greek terms *skene* and *skenoo* were used to refer to the temporary structural dwellings and the act of dwelling temporarily.

Just as the tabernacle had been the center of God's permanent presence with Israel (Ex. 29:43, 45), God has taken up residence among His people through His Son Jesus (John 1:14). God's glory once restricted to the tabernacle is now visible through Jesus (Rev. 21:3).

Many people today seem to be obsessed with making their lives better, more meaningful, comfortable, and secure—usually according to the world's standards. Throughout his Gospel, John distinguished between simply living and possessing true life. Real life has a spiritual dimension that is eternal and has an enduring, unending quality. It is a life in relationship with our Heavenly Father, empowered by the Spirit (see Key Words, p. 11). The life given by the Word is also the * light (see Key Words Glossary, pp. 160–161) of men. Through the Word, the * darkness of ignorance, sin-blinded eyes, and self-deception are dispelled; and humanity can see!

How would you explain to a nonbeliever or a new convert the difference between living and living in Jesus?

JESUS IS LIGHT JOHN 1:5

Read John 1:5. John says that Jesus is the source of natural and spiritual life and this same life was the natural and spiritual light of men. We live in an age when artificial and natural light are in abundance. However, spiritual darkness hangs like a dark cloud.

What do the following verses say about this Light?

- John 8:12
- John 12:46
- John 3:19

The Word makes a universal appeal. The floodlight of God's truth is that the Lord Jesus Christ is our Creator, and He has come into the world and paid the penalty for our sins. The Light reveals our sinfulness and affirms that by faith we can receive forgiveness and eternal life. John states that the light shines in \star darkness (see Key Words Glossary, pp. 160–161), but "the darkness did not overcome it." Darkness cannot shut out this Light. In this Light we all can see.

How will you impress on the unbeliever the urgency to accept the light and move into the full light of faith and salvation?

JESUS IS LOVE JOHN 1:11-14

Read John 1:11-14. Rejection can be painful. Christ came to the world He created, and it did not know Him. Even the Jewish nation chosen by God to prepare the rest of the world for the Messiah rejected Him. John's Gospel routinely uses "world" to describe people in rebellion against God, people lost in sin.

Despite God's priceless gift, how does the world still reject Him? Conduct personal introspection. What are some ways you have rejected the Word, and what corrective actions will you take?

Christ's coming was a mission of love (John 3:16). He demonstrated love and is the essence of love. The Word, full of grace and truth (see Key Words, p. 11), was the once-and-for-all sacrifice that satisfied God's requirements for the removal of sin. Christ's love compels us to share the good news with the world. Those who see its truth and believe will find new life on this side of heaven and will live forevermore.

Live It!

Who is Jesus? In this lesson alone He is the second Person of the Trinity, the only begotten Son of the Father. He is God and has always existed; He is the incarnate Word, Light, Life, Love, Savior, the Agent of creation, and the Sustainer of the universe—fully man and fully God. Christ is the perfect revelation of God; everything that can be said of Jesus is true of God. Who is Jesus to you?

These inexplicable truths are too amazing to stockpile. This week introduce someone to Christ and His mission of love. Share your personal testimony about the Word and ask God's guidance to help them understand so they too can experience new life in Him and the promise of heaven.

SO WHAT? How does this apply to me?

John's presentation of the Word moves from God who is the Creator in the beginning to God who reveals the Father because He knows the Father. Jesus spanned the gap between God and humanity as the Messiah—fully God and fully man. He dwelt among His people, revealing God full of grace and truth. Those who believe and receive the gospel of Jesus can be reborn spiritually, adopted into the royal family of God with the promise of eternal life. The way to share in this intimacy with the Father is to receive salvation through Jesus and to obey the Great Commission. Find them! Bring them in! Grow them up! Send them out!

 How will you reflect the light of Christ in your life in order to be a credible witness in a dark world?



 What is so amazing about grace and truth coming through one man? How will you communicate this Word in your own words to help others understand the light, life, and love of the gospel message?

1. THE LIGHT GIVER

John 1:4-5

The light of Jesus shines forever.
Since light comes from God, nothing can drive it away. In life no challenge, difficulty, or hardship can stop the light of Jesus from shining. That is, if you believe. Jesus is willing to illuminate every heart and soul that is open to receive Him. Jesus came to bring beauty and light to all creation.

Lord, I open my heart to receive Your light in every area of my life.

2. APPLE OF HIS EYE

John 1:11-14

Jesus showed His great love by coming down to us. The author of creation became human and felt rejection from those He came to save.

We must never forget that Jesus loves us.

Yes, with all our weaknesses and shortcomings, we are still the "apple of His eye!" No matter what we've done, His plan was always to write our names on His heart for eternity.

Jesus, thank You for loving me unconditionally. I willingly receive Your abundant grace today.

DAILY READINGS

3. BE TRANSFORMED

Jesus wants to fill you. Then He wants to transform you. The more we willingly submit to Him, the more we become like Him. Matthew 4:19-22


As a child, did you ever play Follow the Leader?

HOW TO TEACH

BEFORE YOU TEACH

FOR UNIT 1, LESSON 1 (pp. 11-15)

STEP 1

SET THE TONE.

This first session sets the tone for the entire unit. Provide a brief summary about the four-session unit to generate interest. Prayerfully immerse yourself in a thorough background study of the lesson content. Approach the lesson with a learner attitude, seeking new insights, anticipating questions, feelings, and concerns your class members may have about the lesson.

STEP 2

ENGAGE AND CONNECT.

Getting class members to dialogue and engage in activities that clarify the lesson will improve their retention levels by 50 percent, as opposed to just lecturing to them. Gear the lesson to appeal to the senses and address multiple learning styles. Pray for God's direction for engagement and connection.

STEP 3

APPLICATION. APPLICATION. APPLICATION.

Focus on the truth of the Word and the message being conveyed. Have the theological discussion, but also create a safe environment for learners to be transparent about the lesson's impact today. Use thought-provoking questions to encourage them to share how this Word can help them grow as believers and make a difference in their lives and the lives of those with whom they interact.

STEP 4

PRAY WITHOUT CEASING.

Pray throughout the preparation and delivery of the lesson. Open and close the session with a timely prayer, providing opportunities for class members and guests to share prayer requests. You or the prayer leader may solicit volunteers to pray. Thank God for this lesson and for the ones to follow in this unit.

BACK

Greet class members and guests. Say: Last week we closed out "Stand," a powerful unit on influence. What better way to propel us into a new unit of study on Jesus, the most influential person that ever lived. Invite volunteers to briefly share their outcome of last week's Live It! challenge.

Say: Application of each of the lessons is what separates it from a great Bible story and a personal spiritual growth opportunity. Transition into today's study by inviting learners to share insights from their study of lesson 1.

YOU OBJECT LESSON



RESUMÉ

Provide copies of a well-written resume. **Say:** A resume is a marketing tool designed to capture the reader's attention, propel you through the stages of the recruitment process, and land a job. Explain that a resumé is your first introduction to the hiring manager. It provides a synopsis of your skills, affiliations, accomplishments, experiences, and education. **Say:** John's prologue (John 1:1-18) is Christ's impeccable resumé. Emphasize that Christ is seeking the position of our personal Savior, not for hire but as an extension of His grace. He is exclusively qualified. **Ask:** What do you know about Jesus that would impact your decision to choose Him as your Savior? **Say:** By saying yes to this candidate, you will be blessed for all eternity. Shop His resumé to everyone you know.

INTRODUCING JESUS (TEACHING PLAN)

FOR UNIT 1, LESSON 1 (pp. 11-15)

INTRODUCTION

Before the start of class, select a one-page resumé and a brief job description for which that person IS NOT qualified. Provide enough copies for each class member. Additionally, provide each learner a copy of a basic blank resumé template with space to fill in information for each component.

Direct learners' attention to the Object Lesson (p. 102). **Say:** *Take a few minutes to review the resumé provided and determine if the applicant is a worthwhile candidate for the position. Why or why not?* Discuss responses.

Say: Christ is not seeking gainful employment but is offering salvation through grace to everyone that believes in Him. Today's lesson will acquaint us with Jesus' qualifications as the Word, Life, Light, and Love.

DIG INTO THE TEXT

JESUS IS THE WORD

JOHN 1:1-2

- Invite a learner to read aloud John 1:1-2. Discuss the power of words to communicate our thoughts, emotions, character, and intentions. Say: Communication plays a critical role in human affairs. Words can hurt, heal, or serve as a weapon of conflict or as a tool of cooperation. Point out that John, in his introduction of Jesus, capitalized on the universal use of words as a basis for providing a deeper understanding of Jesus, the Word. Three claims are made about the Word in these verses: the existence, dwelling place, and nature. Ask: What are the bases
- of these claims? What message does John hope to convey to his audience by sharing these three points?
- Say: An introduction is the presentation of one person or persons to another. Explain that introductions are generally made as a display of proper etiquette to establish a friendship, to initiate a working or romantic relationship, or to give or receive assistance.
 Ask: What are John's intentions for this introduction? What strategy might you use, based on these verses, to present Christ to others?

JESUS IS LIFE

JOHN 1:3-4

- Invite learners to describe what they would consider as "living the good life." Say: In today's society people have an obsession and fascination with acquiring more things like increasing their bank accounts, acquiring the latest-greatest-must-have technology or bigger better homes and cars, and traveling to exotic places. Point out that sadly the gratification is fleeting, especially when we discover that the good life is a moving target with the standards set by the world. King Solomon, the wisest man that ever lived, went on a quest to discover the meaning of life
- thousands of years ago and found the answer. His words of wisdom might be that we are looking for life in all the wrong places.
- Read John 1:3-4 aloud. Say: John wants us to meet the Giver of both physical and spiritual life. All things were made by Him, and anything that was made, He made it. Emphasize that Jesus was the exclusive Agent of creation and the Creator of life. Ask: Why did God create mankind, and how are we living up to that standard? How does Christ's life bring light to our lives?

INTRODUCING JESUS (TEACHING PLAN)

FOR UNIT 1, LESSON 1 (pp. 11-15)

JESUS IS LIGHT John 1:5

• Ask a learner to read John 1:5 in the dark. Then turn the light on and make the same request. Ask: What difference does the light make? Say: The dark room is a simple example of our world. It's a dark place, despite the natural and artificial light. Point out that Jesus is the light that has come into the world to expose the darkness and offer the permanent antidote (John 8:12). Ask: How does Christ bring light

to the entire world? As His disciple, what is your role in illuminating the world? Briefly discuss responses.

• Say: Light and darkness are opposing forces. Verse 5 announces the triumph of light over darkness. Some people reject the light and stumble around in darkness, spending eternity separated from Christ. Ask: How would you invite someone into the light of Christ?

JESUS IS LOVE JOHN 1:11-14

- Remind learners of three basic types of love: eros
 (or erotic love), philos (the love between friends),
 and agape (unconditional love). Explain that eros
 is based on physical attraction, and philos is based
 on a give-and-take relationship. The highest form of
 love is God's agape love for His humankind.
- The most amazing example of God's love toward us

was when He sent His one and only Son, Jesus Christ, to His suffering and death on the cross for our sins. Christ was perfect in every way and had no obligation to die for us, but He chose to give His life. Jesus is the personification of God's love. As phenomenal as this message is, some will accept God's love, and others will reject it. **Ask:** How will you respond to God's astounding love?

SO WHAT? HOW DOES THIS APPLY TO ME?

"Introducing Jesus" is both a title and a call to action. John, an eyewitness and disciple, took a unique approach to present Jesus as the Word. Steve Harvey used his comedic platform to make an impactful introduction. Meeting Jesus should top everyone's "bucket list." You've not truly lived until you've met Jesus. Assist others in filling their spiritual vacuum as well. Use your God-given style and sphere of influence to share this life-changing and life-defining message of love.

 As a disciple of Christ, what personal message are you prepared to share with others about who Jesus is?

- What kinds of apprehensions or challenges have you experienced in making this crucial introduction, and what actions have you taken to resolve them?
- What makes "Introducing Jesus" an evangelism lesson, and what is your specific role and your church's corporate role in responding in obedience?
- What elements of who the Word is do you still need clarification or teaching on?

CLOSE THE SESSION

Remind learners that this lesson challenges believers, first, to receive the phenomenal message of who Jesus is; second, to understand the present and eternal impact the truth of the message can have on all who would believe it; and third, to describe the greatest love story ever told—the agape love shown by God toward His highest creation. Invite learners to take a moment to think about one thing from the lesson they would like to thank God for, and then close with a sentence prayer from each person.

UNIT 1, LESSON 1 (pp. 11-15)

Introducing Jesus

Lesson Passage: John 1:1-5,11-14
The Question: Who is Jesus?
The Point: Jesus is everything that God is.

This commentary is designed to help you think about the question, "Who is Jesus?" and to drive home this one truth: Jesus is everything that God is.

FOCUS ON THESE POINTS

Jesus Is the Word (John 1:1-2)

Many of the dominant themes in the Gospel of John are revealed in the first several verses. His nature, His role in creation, and His work on behalf of humanity are all mentioned. His character as the life and light Giver are also introduced.

The Word was preexistent because Jesus was present at creation. The scope of the phrase "in the beginning" (John 1:1) is broadened exponentially by the fact that the Word became flesh while maintaining complete divinity. This blessed event was a major turning point for humankind. "The Word was with God" affirms Jesus' distinct identity, assures fellowship with God, and provides clear indication of the existence of the Trinity. The Deity of the Word is definitively established because the "Word was God" (John 1:1). All that is true of the Word is also true of God without diminishing His sovereignty as the first Person of the Trinity.

Jesus Is Life (John 1:3-4)

Jesus, as the Source and Creator of life, is a major theme of the apostle John. Confirmation of this theme is provided in these statements: "For just as the Father has life in Himself, so also He has granted to the Son to have life in Himself" (John 5:26). "[He] gives life to the world" (John 6:33). "I am the resurrection and the life" (John 11:25). "Jesus Christ ... is the true God and eternal life" (I John 5:20).

Verse 3 gives the Word superiority over all of creation and reinforces the unparalleled personal communion between God and the Word. In addition to the role of the Word as Creator, we also recognize His position as life Giver.

Just as the Word of God in the Old Testament was often revelatory, enlightening humanity of the nature and will of God, so the Word in the New Testament (Jesus) reveals truth, the true nature of God and humanity, and the true path to salvation, the nature of real life.

Jesus Is Light (John 1:5)

The Word, which is the Light, is more powerful than darkness, and all humanity will be judged by the light of God's will and truth. Through the Word the darkness of ignorance, sin-blinded eyes, and self-deception are dispelled; humanity is illumined by truth. John 1:5 states that light shines in darkness, but "the darkness did not overcome it." The word "overcome" (Gk. katalambano) literally means "to apprehend, to lay hold of so as to posses as one's own, or to seize."

The light of God's truth is that the Lord Jesus Christ is our Creator, and He has come into the world and paid the penalty for our sins. The light tells us that we are sinners, and by faith we can receive forgiveness and eternal life. For some the light of Jesus Christ is the source of their lives. "But to all who did receive Him, He gave them the right to be children of God, to those who believe in His name" (John 1:12).

Jesus Is Love (John 1:11-14)

Even though Christ created the world, His highest creation did not recognize Him when He came to earth in the flesh. Despite the overwhelming evidence that Jesus was the Savior, even the Jewish nation (whom Christ had chosen to prepare the rest of the world for His coming) rejected Him.

John 3:16 captures the true essence of the message: "For God loved the world in this way: He gave His One and Only Son, so that everyone who believes in Him will not perish but have eternal life." Love has been declared the criterion for distinguishing the children of God from the children of the Devil. In God's deep abiding love, He has taken up residence among us through His Son Jesus. The fact that the sovereign God dwelt among humans speaks volumes about His love and grace toward His people.



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
