Life of David - Gregg Matte

You may have heard David was a man after God’s own heart (1 Samuel 13:14). And He was, but he was also a man like you. He had extreme ups and downs throughout his life. Many times, he honored God, but sometimes he failed miserably. But God still used him, and God wants to use you, no matter what your life has been like to this point. Over the next nine weeks we’ll journey together through the life of David. We’ll see the good, the bad, and the ugly, but ultimately we will see he was a man after God’s own heart. You can be too.

James - Noe Garcia

James is one of the most practical books in the Bible. It’s even been called the “Proverbs of the New Testament” for the amount of relatable and understandable words we find there. However, despite being among the easiest books to understand, it is one of the most difficult to live out. Repeatedly James asks us to put our money where our mouth is. He expects that we obey what we find in Scripture. He assumes that faith in Jesus is not just a set of propositions we can all agree to, but also a way of life that we must choose and embrace daily. When we follow these truths, through the power of the Holy Spirit, we demonstrate to the world around us what it looks like to take Jesus seriously.

Parables - Robby Gallaty

Around one third of Jesus’s teaching was in parables, and the truth that they communicate is essential for our spiritual growth. In His parables, Jesus took common images from the world around Him and crafted memorable stories to teach a spiritual point. Through them, we see the heart of what it means to follow Jesus.

Jonah - Juan Sanchez

Most of us know pieces of the story of Jonah. We likely know about the storm and the fish and the three days Jonah spent inside it. And maybe we know about the evil of Nineveh. But do we know the whole story? The book of Jonah reveals the grace of God to those who have rejected Him and to those like Jonah (and us), who claim to obey Him but still desire our own way.

1 John - Vance Pitman

In the first two chapters of 1 John, John addressed the believer's walk with God. Our walk can be defined as the way we live each day. Those who have been transformed by the Holy Spirit will desire to walk closely with God. John made clear that his purpose in writing was to warn his readers against sin. But he also reminded us that when we sin—and we all do—we have an advocate with the Father in Jesus, who never has (1 John 2:1).

The Bible Doesn't Say That - Grant Gaines

Only God can judge me. Follow your heart. God will never give you more than you can handle. We've all heard these well-known sayings. They are so well known, many people even believe they are found in the Bible. While these sayings aren't actually found in the Bible, Scripture does have something to say about the subjects each of them address.

The Beatitudes - Ray Ortlund

The real Jesus. The historical Jesus. The biblical Jesus. The Jesus who stands over all of us and tells us to repent. That unsettling Jesus is the one we want. Without Him, nothing will ever change. With Him, our hearts can finally crack open to the love of God. How can we disconnect with the Jesuses of our own invention and reconnect with the real Jesus?

The Beatitudes are a direct route back to Him. Let's start over. Let's listen again. Let's peel away the layers of falsehood that keep Him at a distance. All the Lord is looking for is need, openness. The risen Christ is looking down on us right now and asking, "Who needs me enough to start listening?"

Battle Lines - Vance Pitman

For most of us, fighting battles is reserved for the make-believe world of movies, books, and games. But as Paul gets to the end of his letter to the Ephesians, he reminds us that we are in a battle, whether we know it or not, whether we realize it or not, and even whether we're ready for it or not. We are engaged in a very real spiritual battle. The battle lines have been drawn, but Christ has given us all we need for victory.

Minor Prophets - J.D. Greear

In the Minor Prophets, God lays out His plan for the restoration of Israel. He points forward to a coming Messiah who would heal and redeem what Israel's sin had messed up. If you feel like you've messed up your life with your sin, these books are written for you.

1 Peter - Ray Ortlund

God is creating a new community in this world, a new community of people reborn by the Holy Spirit. They look the same as others. They suffer the same as others. But God is rearranging their interiority. And it shows. There is something about them that doesn't make sense in this world. First Peter 1:3 sets a tone of exuberant praise: "Blessed be the God and Father of our Lord Jesus Christ." That's the voice of suffering people reborn by the Holy Spirit. Cultural religion cannot

create people like that. Marginal religion cannot make us resilient in weakness, cheerful in absence, fascinated with irrelevance. What 1 Peter is really talking about is a miracle that God alone can produce within us. Peter is telling us here what reborn people look like.

Proverbs - Juan Sanchez

It may feel like the book of Proverbs is all over the map. The subject matter seems to change at a moments notice. But there is unity in the book of Proverbs. Proverbs repeatedly calls us to hear God's instruction in order to obtain the wisdom that begins with a fear of God and live the life of a wise person rather than be cursed like the fool.

Titus/Philemon - J.D. Greear

Godliness is something that goes down to the passions of your heart. It affects what you love. There were all kinds of false teachers in Crete, where Titus planted a church, just like there are all kinds of false teachers today. While these false religions make people busy, they don't actually cultivate godliness. In Titus, Paul explained why the gospel produces godliness in a way that nothing else can. Ultimately, Titus leave us with a question: Is your faith producing godliness?

Philemon was a really wealthy man who had a bunch of servants. One of them named Onesimus had stolen a bunch of stuff from Philemon's house and then ran away to Rome. In a crazy twist of providence, Onesimus runs into the apostle Paul who was being held in a minimum security prison there in Rome. So Paul leads Onesimus to Christ. Then he sends Onesimus back to Philemon to turn himself in. He also sent a letter with Onesimus to Philemon and essentially said, "I'm praying that you, Philemon, will put into action the generosity that comes from your faith, as you understand and experience all the good things that we have in Christ." While our circumstances may not be similar to Philemon, this letter has application for every follower of Christ.

The Way of Weakness - J.T. English

We don't want to embrace weakness. We embrace power and control. You likely spend most of your time, most of your day, and most of your life, not growing in weakness, but trying to grow in strength, trying to do it all, and trying to be everything for everybody. But disciples of Jesus are those who are learning how to live in humble imitation of Jesus by living a cross shaped life, embracing our weakness, and seeking God's strength.

Sacrifice - Daniel Fusco

It's been said that Leviticus is the place Bible reading plans go to die. It is easy to get bogged down with the seemingly endless laws detailed throughout the book. But the fact that Leviticus is included in Scripture tells us clearly that God has something to teach us from this book. In this series, we are going to look specifically at some of the sacrifices outlined through the book. When we consider these different types of sacrifices, it's important to realize they acted as a forerunner or a shadow. These sacrifices were designed to point to God's ultimate sacrifice, Jesus Christ.

The 7 Churches - Tony Merida

Be faithful to the end. Don't give up. Don't give in. Our King has overcome, and He will come again. That's the message of the book of Revelation—be faithful to the end in light of the fact that Jesus has overcome and He's coming again. The message to the seven churches is a

microcosm of the larger message of the book of Revelation. To the one who conquers, the one who doesn't cave in to pressure, and the one who doesn't give up in the face of struggle and persecution, great blessing is promised.
